

WHY READ AT HOME

All research shows that children who read regularly at home are more likely to develop a love of reading and make better progress in school than children who don't.

Reading to your child creates a calm and caring atmosphere and it will help them to create a happy and positive relationship with books and reading

Listening to stories regularly helps children to make predictions, develop rhyming skills, increases logical thinking, imagination and curiosity.

Reading with your child will increase their vocabulary, which improves their reading and





<u>TOP TIPS FOR READING</u>

<u>AT HOME</u>

- Set aside some quiet time and find a place without any distractions. Turn TVs and all screens off!
- Keep reading sessions short and enjoyablereading should never be a chore!
- Give plenty of praise and let you know that you are enjoying listening to them read.
- Sometimes read with your child or take it in turns to read a page each.
- Visit the library to find books that your child is interested in. Reading is a great way to develop hobbies and interests.
- Listen to stories on CDs, the radio or the internet and give your child a wide variety of text types including magazines, recipes and instructions.
- Children of all ages enjoy hearing stories. Read aloud to your child as often as you can.

Our new reading books closely match the letters and sounds your child is learning in their phonics lessons.

In each book, on the inside cover, there are steps to follow before reading the book e.g. practising sounds and key words and checking your child understands the meaning of different words that appear in the book.

Children will keep each book until they are reading it **fluently** and **confidently**. This could be up to two weeks and books will be changed by a teacher.

Once children have completed all of the Phonics Phases, they will move onto

reading a varied selection of reading books stored in each classroom.
